


Halloween Trick-or-Treating Set for October 30

The American Red Cross offers parents some safety tips to help prepare their children for a safe and enjoyable trick-or-treat holiday. Following some common sense practices can keep events safer and more fun.




- Walk, slither, and sneak on sidewalks, not in the street.
- Look both ways before crossing the street to check for cars, trucks, and low-flying brooms.
- Cross the street only at corners.
- Don't hide or cross the street between parked cars.
- Wear light-colored or reflective-type clothing so you are more visible. (And remember to put reflective tape on bikes, skateboards, and brooms, too!)
- Plan your route and share it with your family. If possible, have an adult go with you.
- Carry a flashlight to light your way.
- Keep away from open fires and candles. (Costumes can be extremely flammable.)
- Visit homes that have the porch light on.
- Accept your treats at the door and never go into a stranger's house.
- Use face paint rather than masks or things that will cover your eyes.
- Be cautious of animals and strangers.
- Have a grown-up inspect your treats before eating. And don't eat candy if the package is already opened. Small, hard pieces of candy are a choking hazard for young children.

The Warr Acres Police Department is participating in a program to collect unused cell phones and their chargers for use in a community program to help victims of domestic abuse. Once charged, the cell phones can only be used to call 911 and should be used only for an emergency. Phone service is not required for a cell phone to reach a 911 call center. Warr
